Department Rules and Regulations:

1. Entries can only be made online via the Delaware State Fair's website beginning 9:00 AM April 1, 2021 thru 11:59 PM June 1, 2021.
2. Any and all premiums may be adjusted by The Delaware State Fair Board of Directors based on funding sources.
3. The following classes are open to all boys and girls regularly enrolled in all day classes of Agriscience in high schools and middle schools of Delaware; **grades 6 through 12**. Graduating seniors are eligible to exhibit in the year of graduation only.
4. Ag Instructors will be responsible for presenting to the Superintendent or an Assistant a list of all exhibitors from their school who have been issued passes to the Fair by Wednesday, July 21.
5. Exhibitors must securely attach tags to their items with the assistance of Department Personnel. (Entries will not be accepted by department personnel until entry tags are securely affixed.)
6. All entries exhibited must have been raised or made on a farm, garden, or Agriscience classroom with the aid of the student.
7. All entries must be through the school where the boy or girl is enrolled.
8. All entries must be in the Fair's FFA Building (The Centre) and ready to be displayed by 12:00 Noon, Wednesday, July 21. The exhibit area will be closed at 12:00 Noon so that no more exhibits can enter the building and so the judging may begin.
9. One pass to the Fair will be given to each student who exhibits five (5) or more products.
10. Only classes listed below will be considered for prize money.
11. No entry fee will be charged.
12. Exhibitors are responsible for their products after the Fair.
13. All entries will be on a State basis only.
14. Cash awards and ribbons will be given for the 1st six places.
15. Entries must be removed between 8:00 AM and 12:00 Noon on Sunday, August 1. Premiums will not be paid on exhibits removed before Sunday.
16. No exhibitor can make more than one entry per class. Late Entries will not be accepted.
17. Gallon containers for grain and silage must be used and will be supplied by The Delaware State Fair. No exhibit of grain will be accepted unless it contains 1 gallon. Due to safety, no gallon glass containers will be allowed.

18. Teachers shall not communicate with judges or official score person during the judging of the exhibits or while the scores are being calculated.
19. Any entry taking up too much space may be removed after judging with consent of superintendent and exhibitor.
20. Each Agriscience student in the State is responsible for entering their exhibit(s) on-line via the Delaware State Fair website by June 1, 2021 (www.delawarestatefair.com).
21. Each Agriscience teacher having students exhibiting will be part of the exhibit area committee and is responsible for all activities prior to judging, after judging, during Fair week, and removal of exhibits on Sunday August 1.
22. All spoiled vegetables will be removed daily by the exhibit area committee and the tags and/or ribbons will be left on the bench where the exhibit was removed.
23. Each school is responsible for care of their own live exhibits.
24. Care will be taken to protect exhibits from injury, but the Delaware State Fair will not in any way hold themselves responsible for accidents, loss and damage by water, fire, theft or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss sustained. All animals and exhibits are entered at the owner's risk.
25. Large Chapter Exhibits, Shadow Boxes, Landscape Settings, and Agriscience Fair Projects must be moved into the exhibit area and set up prior to Tuesday, July 20 at 5:00 PM. Minor last minute alterations will be allowed on Wednesday, July 21.
 - a. Definition of minor alteration is the watering, placing of fallen or misplaced display items from overnight, plugging in lights, playing music. Nothing may be added to the display, simply adjusted.

POLICY REGARDING ACCOMODATIONS FOR EXHIBITORS

The Delaware State Fair, Inc. exhibitor program (i.e. livestock, competitive exhibits and contests) shall be accessible to the wide diversity of youth who live our region, regardless of their backgrounds and characteristics — including physical, mental or emotional abilities and/or limitations.

Exhibitors with disabilities are entitled to be able to participate in the activities with their peers and any necessary accommodations must be made to make that possible. Any accommodation for an exhibitor with a disability should:

1. Allow an exhibitor with a disability to participate in the same collective activity as all other exhibitors at the same age level. Observation of the activity without direct involvement does not constitute participation.
2. Be determined with a stated goal to minimize direct adverse impact on how other participants in the activity perform or are evaluated. Every effort should be made to minimize the effects of the accommodation on other participants.
3. Be assessed on a case-by-case basis. The assessment and determination of the level of accommodation(s) should include consultation with the exhibitor, the exhibitor's parents or guardian, activity leader such as a Youth Program Advisor or Field Specialist, and a Fair program representative. Consultation with vocational rehabilitation professionals or professionals who teach or provide services to the exhibitor with the disability is also a preferred level of interaction to determine appropriate and reasonable accommodations.
4. Be reasonable. Accommodations are considered reasonable if they do not change the fundamental nature of the program or alter the essential criteria for participation. If an accommodation does not alter the fundamental nature of the program, then it is reasonable and will be provided. Exhibitors with disabilities will be judged using the same criteria as other participants. The accommodation should allow them to participate in the activity and achieve the criteria while not counting against the final determination of success.

Examples of possible accommodations include modifying rules, policies or timing of events; eliminating architectural or physical barriers; providing interpreters; modifying equipment; providing additional spacing needs; providing verbal or modified testing; allowing the use of digital technology (e.g. letter boards, text-to-speech programs or appropriate applications); or other types of accommodations as deemed appropriate.

The Delaware State Fair, Inc. respects the privacy of the individual participant. Information regarding an exhibitor's request for accommodation is extremely confidential. Any information that is gathered in order to assist the exhibitor in order to accomplish the goal of full program participation with accommodation will be used only for that purpose.

General Policies for Delaware State Fair Exhibitors

Parking

In an effort to be more safety conscious and to improve the appearance of the grounds, vehicles will not be allowed to park inside the fairgrounds property of the Delaware State Fair. Those livestock exhibitors who need to make deliveries to their exhibit area will be required to do so prior to 12 Noon each day. After 12 Noon, all vehicles will be required to park in the exhibitor lot or in the main parking lot. Violators of the parking policy are subject to be towed. All exhibitors owned cars parking in the exhibitor parking lot must display an exhibitor parking hang tag. Due to limited capacity in this lot, parking with a hang tag is on a first come - first served basis. Livestock trailers will be parked in a designated area in the south parking lot. Cars and trucks shall not be parked around barns.

Premiums and Awards

Every effort will be made to see that there are no errors made in the payment of premiums. However, if an exhibitor finds an error, proof of such error must be communicated to the Delaware State Fair Administration Office on or before November 1, 2021. After this date, no corrections will be considered. Checks that are not cashed after 90 days of issue will NOT be reissued.

Advertising

No person will be permitted to distribute advertising material upon the fairgrounds except from their place of business or exhibit space. The tacking or posting of an advertisement, bills, etc., other than within the space occupied by exhibits is strictly prohibited. The distribution of handbills, flyers, and heralds will not be permitted under any circumstances. Anyone violating this rule is liable to fine or expulsion from the grounds. Begging, soliciting, singing, or public speaking is expressly prohibited.

Entry Removal

Entries MUST be removed by Sunday August 1, 2021. No exceptions. All items left will be discarded immediately after the Fair.

Pet Policy

With the exception of service dogs, no pets are allowed on the grounds.

Bikes, Skateboards, & In-Line Skates

Bikes, skateboards, and in-line skates are expressly prohibited on the fairgrounds.

Electrical Extension Cords

Any and all electrical extension cords used in any building on the fairgrounds MUST BE 12.3 gauge or heavier. There will be NO EXCEPTIONS!

GUIDE TO WEARING FACE COVERINGS AT THE 2021 FAIR

Guidance effective as of March 8, 2021

A. OUTSIDE

1. A FACE COVERING **MUST** BE WORN BY EVERYONE 5 AND OLDER WHEN **OUTSIDE** AND:
 - a. Riding on all shuttles (parking and inside or on-grounds shuttles); or
 - b. When processing through any Gate (main, Gate 2, Gate 3 and Gate 7). This includes all persons entering the gates on foot or in vehicles including patrons, exhibitors, shareholders, directors, vendors, volunteers and staff. If entering through Gate 2 or Gate 3 in a vehicle, the driver and all occupants 5 and older must be wearing a face covering. Entry to the grounds will be denied to any person 5 and older not wearing a face covering; or
 - c. When watching any outside entertainment performances from the adjacent performance seating areas (bleachers and/or benches) identified as:
 - 1) M&T Bank Grandstand Event Related Pit, Track, Stadium & Grandstand Ticketed Areas; and
 - 2) Hertrich Plaza; and
 - 3) Circus; and
 - 4) Racing Pig Show; and
 - 5) Camel Show; and
 - 6) Dog Show; or
 - d. When social distancing of at least 6' distance cannot be maintained between you and other guests that are not part of your household.

B. INSIDE

1. **GENERAL BUILDINGS:** A FACE COVERING **MUST** BE WORN BY EVERYONE 5 AND OLDER WHEN **INSIDE** ANY OF THE FOLLOWING BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURED TENT:
 - a. Administration Office; and
 - b. Any restroom building; and
 - c. Centre Arena (4-H and FFA); and
 - d. Delaware Building; and
 - e. Department of Agriculture and Commodities Buildings; and
 - f. DNREC Building; and
 - g. Dover Building; and
 - h. Exhibit Hall; and
 - i. M&T Bank Grandstand Clubhouse Room; and
 - j. Market Place Tent.
2. **ANIMAL RELATED BUILDINGS:** A FACE COVERING **MUST** BE WORN BY EVERYONE (i.e. exhibitors, guests, patrons and viewing audience) 5 AND OLDER WHEN **INSIDE** ANY OF THE FOLLOWING ANIMAL RELATED BUILDINGS:
 - a. Block Barns Nos. 72 – 78; and
 - b. Delmarva Building; and
 - c. Kent Barn; and
 - d. New Castle Building; and
 - e. Quillen Arena; and
 - f. Schabinger Pavilion; and
 - g. Simpson Barn; and
 - h. Sussex Barn.

*Any child enrolled in Kindergarten and up to eighteen (18) years of age shall wear a face covering following the rules and requirements for adult contained in the COVID-19 State of Emergency and its modifications except when doing so would inhibit the individual's health. Parents and caregivers must supervise use of face covering by children to avoid misuse.



Delaware 4-H Foundation and/or the FFA Foundation Animal Buyback Policy If A Virtual Auction



Animals Owned by the Delaware 4-H Foundation
and/or the Delaware FFA Foundation



This policy sets forth guidelines to purchase animals donated to the Delaware 4-H Foundation or the Delaware FFA Foundation from a virtual junior livestock auction at the Delaware State Fair. This policy does not govern the purchase of animals donated to individual 4-H Clubs, FFA Chapters or any other organization or person.

1. On the day following the junior livestock auction at the Delaware State Fair, any junior exhibitor whose animal was purchased at the sale and donated back to the Delaware 4-H Foundation or the Delaware FFA Foundation may repurchase that animal between the hours of 9:00 am and 11:00 am.
2. A list of animals available for exhibitor purchase can be viewed the day following the Junior Livestock Auction, starting at 8am. Information on how to view a list of animals will be posted in the barns.
3. Buyback prices are set at the discretion of the two organizations, as owners of the animals, and will be posted on the website. Payment should be made to the appropriate foundation in person or by mail. Cash or check will be accepted in person, or check payments may be sent by mail. See details at the bottom of this fact sheet.
4. In order for an exhibitor to purchase their own animal during the designated time of 9:00 am – 11:00am, the exhibitor (or their representative) must email the requested information to Kristin Cook at kristin@udel.edu.

5. On the day following the junior livestock auction, the public may bid on any animal donated back to the Delaware 4-H Foundation or the Delaware FFA Foundation and not repurchased by the junior exhibitor.
6. Animals available for public bid can be viewed the day following the Junior Livestock Auction, starting at 1:00 pm. A link will be posted in the barns and on the DSF Junior Livestock auction facebook page. Emailed bids for available animals will be accepted between the hours of 1:00 pm - 3:00 p.m. on the day after the Livestock Auction. Email the requested information to Kristin Cook at kristin@udel.edu.
Info: auction lot, ear tag, name of bidder, cell phone number, bid per pound (check minimums)
7. The minimum bid per pound will be posted on the website. Emailed bids will be opened starting at 3:00 p.m. and winning bidders will be notified shortly thereafter. Payment for animals may be made in person, or by mail. Payment should be made to the appropriate foundation in person or by mail. Cash or check will be accepted in person, or check payments may be sent by mail. See details at the bottom of this fact sheet.
8. Any animal not repurchased by either of these methods will be sold at the discretion of the foundation designees.

NOTE: Registration papers, if applicable, will not be collected by either foundation. Please make arrangements with the original owner to get the registration papers if they are available.
