## **Entry Drop-Off /Removal Dates and Times:**

- A. Entries will be received on **EITHER** Wednesday, July 21 between 2:00 PM and 5:00 PM in the Dover Building **OR** Sunday, July 25 between 10:00 AM and 1:00 PM in the Dover Building. **Check the specific division you entered in to find your check in date and time.** Vehicle Access onto the property is permitted at Gate 2 until 12:00 Noon.
- B. Judging will begin in the department on either Wednesday, July 21 or Sunday, July 25.
- C. All entries must be removed between 8:00 AM and 12:00 Noon on Sunday, August 1

## **Department Rules and Regulations:**

- A. Entries can only be made online via the Delaware State Fair’s website ([www.delawarestatefair.com](http://www.delawarestatefair.com)) beginning 9:00 AM April 1, 2021 thru 11:59 PM June 1, 2021.
- B. Only one entry per exhibitor per class will be accepted. Late entries will not be accepted.
- C. The Dover Building will open daily from 9:00 A.M. to 9:00 P.M. (except when there is judging in the department). Exhibitors in this department are asked to read and observe the rules governing this department.
- D. In order for the Delaware State Fair to better prepare for all exhibits, we ask that you only enter those classes which you will be able to complete and show at this year’s fair.
- E. Any and all premiums may be adjusted by The Delaware State Fair Board of Directors based on funding sources.
- F. Care will be taken to protect the exhibits from injury, but the Delaware State Fair will not be responsible in any way for accidents, loss and damage by water, fire, theft, or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss sustained. All exhibits are entered at the owner’s risk.
- G. Exhibitors must securely attach tags to their items with the assistance of Department Personnel. (Entries will not be accepted by department personnel until entry tags are securely affixed.)
- H. On Sunday, July 25, competitors who wish to deliver their entries to the Dover Building via car before 11:45am must do so by going to Exhibitor’s Gate 2 (near the Quillen Arena) where they will be given a temporary permit that will allow them to drive to the Raughley Street entrance of the Dover Building. Your vehicle **MUST BE REMOVED** from the grounds and moved into the regular parking lot prior to 12:00pm.
- I. Please read your rules carefully. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact the Department Superintendent or one of the Assistant Superintendents. In the case of a tie, the judges will consider which exhibitor interpreted the rules the best.
- J. All exhibitors must be non-professional. All entries must be the work of an exhibitor who does not use this as a means of income. You may not work in a florist shop (previously or currently) or teach a class involving flowers, horticulture or design.

- K. All horticulture cut specimens must be grown by the exhibitor and displayed in water. All horticulture potted specimens must have been in the exhibitor’s possession for 90 days prior to the start of the Fair (unless otherwise specified).
- L. Accessories and objects added to a design, other than plant material, are permitted when stated in the specific class information and should be in proportion to the design.
- M. Fresh plant material must not be artificially colored.
- N. Classes having less than four (4) entries are not guaranteed to have a First (1st), Second (2nd), and Third (3rd) premium awarded. Due to lack of competition, judges reserve the right to only award select premiums.
- O. Honorable mention can be awarded at the judges’ discretion.
- P. Any special instructions regarding the care and watering of the specimens should be noted or attached to the back of the entry tag.
- Q. All exhibit containers must allow for ample water supply.
- R. Failure to follow any of the rules will result in disqualification.
- S. Florist flowers not accepted unless otherwise noted.
- T. All loose pieces must be secured.

### **Class**

1. My Favorite Color: A fresh “monochromatic” arrangement to represent your favorite color. Can use shades of all of one color.
2. Garden Party: An arrangement of fresh flowers. Container of your choice.
3. Fair Theme: “Your Passport to Summer Fun”: An arrangement using your favorite Fair event. (Accessories permitted must be attached)
4. Hot, Hot, Hot: A fresh arrangement of red, yellow and orange using one or more chili peppers and a terra cotta container.
5. My Memories: An arrangement of fresh flowers inspired by your favorite vacation photo. Can use accessories. Not to exceed 24” in width or height.
6. Trend Setter: An arrangement of Designer’s choice of fresh flowers (accessories permitted). Florist flowers permitted in this entry only. Free style.
7. Celebration: A fresh arrangement using your favorite New Year’s theme. Not to exceed 20” in height or width. (Accessories must be attached.)
8. Now Showing: An arrangement of Designer’s choice of FRESH FLOWERS showcasing your favorite movie. Florist flowers permitted in this entry ONLY, accessories permitted must be attached.

**Judge’s Award:** A Rosette & \$15.00 will be awarded to the outstanding exhibit in the ARTISTIC DESIGN – FRESH: Adult & Intermediate Section.

A design is an arrangement judged for detail and color. Homegrown flowers ONLY.

14. Lazy Days of Summer: A SILK wreath of silk daisies depicting a lazy summer day. Wreath not to exceed 18". Accessories permitted but must be attached.
15. Saddle Up: A SILK arrangement in a cowboy boot – No accessories permitted. Not to exceed 24" in width or height.
16. Down on the Farm: An arrangement of FRESH flowers centered on your favorite farm equipment. Accessories permitted but must be attached.
17. Game Night: An arrangement of fresh flowers using your favorite game. No loose pieces!
18. Candy Gram: A SILK wreath or arrangement using your favorite candy theme. Can be more than one type of candy. No loose pieces!
19. The Great Outdoors: A permanent arrangement made of items you find on the Nature Trail. (Ex. Pine cones, nuts, bark, feathers, shells, etc. BE CREATIVE!)

21. Fruit, Fruit, Fruit: A silk arrangement using artificial fruit in a container of your choice. Not to exceed 24”.
22. It’s a Bling Thing Topiary: An arrangement using something sparkly. Not to exceed 24” in height. Please be sure to weight the container so it’s not top-heavy.
23. In Memory: An arrangement of silk flowers using butterflies. Not to exceed 24”.
24. Hurricane Christmas: A Christmas arrangement using a hurricane lamp or globe. Please make sure globe is securely attached.
25. Summer Breeze: An arrangement of silk flowers in a basket appropriate for a porch no higher than 30” and not to hang.
26. For the Door: A silk design FOR THE DOOR using a fan, broom or hat ONLY. No wreaths. Any theme. Make to hang.
27. Black and White: An arrangement of black and white ONLY using photos or film. Use your imagination. Not to exceed 15” in height.
28. Pitcher Perfect: An arrangement of silk flowers in a pitcher. Pitcher itself not to exceed 8” in height.
29. Thanksgiving Delight: A silk arrangement designed for the Thanksgiving table.
30. How Does Your Garden Grow: A SILK arrangement in a Watering Can, not to exceed 20” in height. Please weight your watering can.
31. Your Favorite Holiday: A silk wreath to depict your favorite holiday (Easter, Thanksgiving, Christmas, etc.). Wreath not to exceed 24” in diameter and must have a hanger attached.
32. Something to Celebrate a Table Top Tree: A seasonal tree of your choice to depict your favorite celebration. Not to exceed 24”. Please weight the base. Be Creative!
33. Saddle Up: A silk arrangement in a cowboy boot. No accessories permitted. Not to exceed 24” in width or height.
34. Natural Nature: Made of dried and natural material from nature. Use your imagination i.e. Feather, stone, moss, pods etc.

# POLICY REGARDING ACCOMODATIONS FOR EXHIBITORS

---

The Delaware State Fair, Inc. exhibitor program (i.e. livestock, competitive exhibits and contests) shall be accessible to the wide diversity of youth who live our region, regardless of their backgrounds and characteristics — including physical, mental or emotional abilities and/or limitations.

Exhibitors with disabilities are entitled to be able to participate in the activities with their peers and any necessary accommodations must be made to make that possible. Any accommodation for an exhibitor with a disability should:

1. Allow an exhibitor with a disability to participate in the same collective activity as all other exhibitors at the same age level. Observation of the activity without direct involvement does not constitute participation.
2. Be determined with a stated goal to minimize direct adverse impact on how other participants in the activity perform or are evaluated. Every effort should be made to minimize the effects of the accommodation on other participants.
3. Be assessed on a case-by-case basis. The assessment and determination of the level of accommodation(s) should include consultation with the exhibitor, the exhibitor's parents or guardian, activity leader such as a Youth Program Advisor or Field Specialist, and a Fair program representative. Consultation with vocational rehabilitation professionals or professionals who teach or provide services to the exhibitor with the disability is also a preferred level of interaction to determine appropriate and reasonable accommodations.
4. Be reasonable. Accommodations are considered reasonable if they do not change the fundamental nature of the program or alter the essential criteria for participation. If an accommodation does not alter the fundamental nature of the program, then it is reasonable and will be provided. Exhibitors with disabilities will be judged using the same criteria as other participants. The accommodation should allow them to participate in the activity and achieve the criteria while not counting against the final determination of success.

Examples of possible accommodations include modifying rules, policies or timing of events; eliminating architectural or physical barriers; providing interpreters; modifying equipment; providing additional spacing needs; providing verbal or modified testing; allowing the use of digital technology (e.g. letter boards, text-to-speech programs or appropriate applications); or other types of accommodations as deemed appropriate.

The Delaware State Fair, Inc. respects the privacy of the individual participant. Information regarding an exhibitor's request for accommodation is extremely confidential. Any information that is gathered in order to assist the exhibitor in order to accomplish the goal of full program participation with accommodation will be used only for that purpose.

# General Policies for Delaware State Fair Exhibitors

---

## **Parking**

In an effort to be more safety conscious and to improve the appearance of the grounds, vehicles will not be allowed to park inside the fairgrounds property of the Delaware State Fair. Those livestock exhibitors who need to make deliveries to their exhibit area will be required to do so prior to 12 Noon each day. After 12 Noon, all vehicles will be required to park in the exhibitor lot or in the main parking lot. Violators of the parking policy are subject to be towed. All exhibitors owned cars parking in the exhibitor parking lot must display an exhibitor parking hang tag. Due to limited capacity in this lot, parking with a hang tag is on a first come - first served basis. Livestock trailers will be parked in a designated area in the south parking lot. Cars and trucks shall not be parked around barns.

## **Premiums and Awards**

Every effort will be made to see that there are no errors made in the payment of premiums. However, if an exhibitor finds an error, proof of such error must be communicated to the Delaware State Fair Administration Office on or before November 1, 2021. After this date, no corrections will be considered. Checks that are not cashed after 90 days of issue will NOT be reissued.

## **Advertising**

No person will be permitted to distribute advertising material upon the fairgrounds except from their place of business or exhibit space. The tacking or posting of an advertisement, bills, etc., other than within the space occupied by exhibits is strictly prohibited. The distribution of handbills, flyers, and heralds will not be permitted under any circumstances. Anyone violating this rule is liable to fine or expulsion from the grounds. Begging, soliciting, singing, or public speaking is expressly prohibited.

## **Entry Removal**

Entries MUST be removed by Sunday August 1, 2021. No exceptions. All items left will be discarded immediately after the Fair.

## **Pet Policy**

With the exception of service dogs, no pets are allowed on the grounds.

## **Bikes, Skateboards, & In-Line Skates**

Bikes, skateboards, and in-line skates are expressly prohibited on the fairgrounds.

## **Electrical Extension Cords**

Any and all electrical extension cords used in any building on the fairgrounds MUST BE 12.3 gauge or heavier. There will be NO EXCEPTIONS!
